## 2006 PRIDE OF Philadelphia

#### PREP CHARTER

Philadelphia Prep Charter won the 2006 Pennsylvania Class II Boys basketball championship March 25 in Hershey. With the 82-51 victory over Beaver Falls, Prep Charter became the first team in Philadelphia high school athletic history to win a state championship in any sport.

#### VILLANOVA MEN'S BASKETBALL

Featuring an unconventional fourguard system, the 2005-06 Villanova Men's Basketball team rode its 25-4 record to a number one seed in the 2006 NCAA tournament. As the top seed in the Minneapolis Region, Villanova beat Monmouth in the first round and Arizona in the second to advance to the Sweet 16. A 60-59 overtime thriller over Boston College put the Wildcats in the Elite 8, where they fell to eventual champion Florida.

#### **RYAN HOWARD**

Following up his 2005 Rookie-of the Year season, Ryan Howard slugged 58 home runs in 2006 to win the National League MVP Award. Howard becomes just the fourth Phillie to win the MVP award, joining Chuck Klein (1932), Jim Konstanty (1950) and three-time winner Mike Schmidt (1980. '82 and '86). Howard made his first All-Star team and won the Home Run Derby in Pittsburgh's PNC Park.

# New Home for the Hall?

*Where is the Hall of Fame?* Since inception, that is the question that is most often asked of Hall of Fame associates. Within the next few months they will finally be able to answer that age-old question.

Following a 4-month evaluation process the Hall is down to a short list of three potential sites for an operational office. Evaluations are still ongoing so the sites, located in East Falls, Northern Liberties and East Norriton, will not be revealed during negotiations.

"In addition to the much-needed office space, the most exciting part is that we will develop a preview center for our long-range museum planning," says Hall of Fame President Ken Avallon. "We'll display selected elements of our museum collection in scaled down vignettes as proofs-of-concept for a future, full-service museum."

The Hall of Fame site will function as a base of operations for administration, volunteer coordination, collection management, product development and Hall of Fame Charities. Though display space will be limited, portions of the Hall's collection will be accessible for viewing on a by-appointment basis.

# **Class IV Nominations Underway, Induction in November**

Reggie White, Chuck Klein and Judy Johnson Leading Fan Nomination

Once again, Philadelphia-area sports fans show their savvy as Eagles legend Reggie White, Phillies all-timer Chuck Klein and Negro League great Judy Johnson currently lead the fan nominations for the Hall of Fame's fourth Inductee Class.

Others near the top of the list include **Earl** "*The Pearl*" Monroe, former world record-holder Leroy Burrell, boxing's Tommy Loughran, field hockey legends Beth Anders and Karen Shelton, long-time Major League ump Henry "*Shag*" Crawford, former Temple lacrosse coach Tina Sloan-Green and legendary hoops coach Herb Magee.

"This year's nominations are proof that Philadelphia boasts some of the nation's most knowledgeable fans," states the Hall's Vice President of Foundation Development **Steve Tallant**. "The Hall of Fame's process is not a popularity contest and these nominees are a true indication of the fans' appreciation of the history of sports in the city."

Last July, the Hall held the inaugural Hall of Fame Golf Classic at Blue Bell Country Club. In 2006, the Hall of Fame's impact in the local community continued with the establishment of *Hall of Fame Charities*. # Paul Arizin (1928-2006)

This past December, the passing of Paul Arizin shook the Philadelphia sports community.

One of area's true sports legends, Arizin starred at Villanova in the late 1940s and, after serving with the Marines in Korea, throughout the 1950s with the Warriors. In the early days of the NBA, Pitchin' Paul was one of the first superstars with ten All-Star appearances, two scoring titles, while leading the Warriors to the 1956 NBA Championship.

These exploits landed Arizin on the NBA's 25th anniversary team and as one of the 50 Greatest Players in NBA History. He is a Charter Class member of the Philadelphia Sports Hall of Fame.

Though forever known for his oncourt accomplishments, articles were filled with quotes from the likes of Harvey Pollack, Arnie Risen, Dr. Jack Ramsay, Jay Wright, Billy Cunningham and Bill Campbell, all speaking of the humble, goodnatured, gentleman.

However, perhaps Arizin's greatest accomplishment was off the court. as the talk in December was not about Paul Arizin, the *player*, but about Paul Arizin, the man.

# **Philly Hall Restoring Liberty Bell from** Veterans Stadium

Local groups working together on unique project

As spring began in 2004, on a crisp, Sunday morning, a generation of sports fans watched as the only stadium they had known disappeared. In about 62 seconds Veterans Stadium ceased to exist. As the cadence of explosions caused the anticipated domino effect, reducing the venue to a mass of twisted concrete and rebar, many asked about the stadium's signature accent piece.



#### "Where is that Liberty Bell?"

Some felt it would have been captivating and more than a bit symbolic to see the 18-foot high iron bell come crashing down, an exclamation point to 33 years of mostly frustrating seasons. After all, the 1980 Phillies were the only



major team to win a championship in The Vet. However, prior to the implosion, in keeping with their tradition and sense of history, the Phillies had the foresight to remove the bell to an offsite storage location.

Though not quite sure of its future, the Phillies felt it appropriate to retain the massive structure. Now, after lying on its

back for about three years, the bell has resurfaced.

After careful consideration, The Phillies deemed the Hall of Fame as the most worthy to ensure the bell remains in the public purview. Though still in the planning stages, the Hall of Fame is working with a number of local organizations on refurbishing then relocating the bell. The project requires complete re-wiring for the lighting, painting, millwrighting, transportation and installation. The Hall's intention is to work with the local trade unions and other organizations interested in participating on a pro-bono basis.
